In the beginning.....

Talk with students, professors, community agencies, alum, professional associations.....find others who are interested.

Get together and share why you are interested and what you want to accomplish. Do an informal needs assessment; follow the energy; make it do-able! Do you want to...

- Learn more about macro-level social work?
- Put social justice and human rights into action?
- Create opportunities for all students to experience macro-inaction?
- > Build professional networks?
- > Other? Or all of the above?

Each group will have its own mission/vision/purpose. There is no one way! You don't need a large number to start in.

Who?

- Undergraduate social work students, faculty, staff;
- Graduate social work students, faculty staff clinical, group, macro, management concentrations;
- Interdisciplinary with students from law, health professions, policy, technology, journalism, criminal justice, etc.

Structure

Your group can be INFORMAL

- Meetings for connection, information-sharing, meet-ups to volunteer at social action events, etc.
- Your group can be FORMAL
- Institutionalized by college as a club (and potentially \$\$ support) with officers, a charter and/or leadership plan.

Core elements

Although every chapter has full autonomy, we recommend grounding the work of your group around these core elements:

- Rooted in social justice insuring that all actions operate out of the core values of the NASW Code of Ethics and are open and inclusive to all;
- Awareness of macro practice Advancing awareness of and experience with the breadth of macro practice from policy to advocacy to organizing for social change and beyond;
- Sustainability of your group engaging and developing student leaders to continue the group each year.

Sources of support....

- Find faculty, staff, administrator or alum who can be an allies and advisors. They can be an anchor as students join and then graduate. They can advocate for visibility and resources. They can organize within the faculty.
- Consider linking with advocacy groups in your community.
- Connect with field placement agencies and field instructors.
- Keep connected to alums.
- Become a recognized student organization in your college or university.
- Consult with National MSWSN; connect with colleagues from other schools to brainstorm and problem-solve.

In the beginning.....

You do not need to contact us before starting. You can use the name, Macro Social Work Student Network, or use your own!

One of the purposes of the National MSWSN is to support the development of MSWSN chapters or clubs nationally and internationally. Be in touch if you need consultation, have hit a road block or need to brainstorm about structure and sustainability.
